As I grow older, there are moments when I feel like I am getting older. For more than 10 years since I came to the United States twenty years ago, one thing in my bucket list was to go to Times Square on New Year's Eve to watch the famous ball drop. But now it is out of the picture in my life because it feels better to start the New Year off clear-minded at home than feeling exhausted from Day 1 after hanging around with massive groups of people in Manhattan.

Am I getting less romantic and more materialistic to think like that? Am I dead inside without the pathos of the young, or am I simply owning my own rhythm of life refusing to be distracted by non-essential things? But I want to believe that we grow as a human and in faith by sending away the things we used to love and taking new things in our heart. Our life is an endless fight to shift our mindset to recenter our lives around what is most important and crucial to us. As a Buddhist monk said, "Sometimes walking away is a step forward."

However, how do we know that all the decisions of sending away and taking new things have been done correctly? Or how do we know even before we make any decision that we will become better and wiser through such a decision? John 21 tells us there is one question we should ask ourselves as the assessment tool before, during, and after our decision.

Jesus asked Peter, "Do you love me more than these?" Whether we spent our whole life as proud Christians or have a lack of excitement but always find our shortcomings first, our answer to this question reveals our center and direction. Regardless of the differences in our opinions about anything, the final question Jesus asks us is if we love him more than anything.

Jesus didn't ask this question to Peter right after his resurrection when he was still scared, confused, and disoriented. Jesus showed his wounds to the disciples and even let them touch them, but he didn't ask this question because they were not ready. Sadly, most of them left Jesus again to go back to fishing, their previous job before they followed Jesus. As Jesus came to Galilee to meet with them once again, John 21:14 says that it was the third time Jesus appeared to them after he was raised from the dead. This time, Jesus asked Peter if he loved him.

This was the question I received from the Presbytery meeting in Nashville to approve my ordination. This is the question that comes to my mind when I am afraid, confused, and doubtful. This question helps me think again, try again, and smile again because Jesus comes back to my center. I hope this is the question for you, as well, especially in the Lenten season that begins on February 14th.

There were 11 of us who traveled the cold to attend the Circle meeting in person. There were 2 more attending on zoom. Together there was a great exchange of ideas and insight. In Hebrews there is reference that Jesus is above angels.



However, what really are angels? When are they seen? Can they be present today? What would God have the angels tell us? As messengers of God, they are described as being present since the creation of earth, before mankind.

We told of favorite Bible stories which included angels. We struggled to envision what an angel might look like and whether they would be male or female. The conclusion was that the messages of guidance and good news conveyed by angelic source could take on many forms. A white flying winged spirit is only one kind of angel. FINANCE COMMITTEE MINUTES DECEMBER 27, 2023

The Finance Committee actually met twice in December. At our meeting on Dec. 4th, we met with Ryan Tomko, our representative from Howe & Rusling. Despite less-than-optimal conditions in the stock market our investments have done well and the outlook for 2024 is even better. We reviewed our portfolio of stocks which still managed to provide an annual income of \$50,024. The value of our bonds is just over \$2,000,000 (we are so very lucky) with an annual income of \$88,087. Ryan T. feels our investment policy is still strong and recommends that it should stay the same.

He also recommends that authorized signatures on the accounts, William Bush, Eric Chapman, and William Hassler, should be updated. We agreed to have my name added, replacing Bill Bush.

He recommended Jonathan Miller at Bonadino as someone to help us answer our questions on a potential audit versus a review and to ask about pricing for both. Eric C. also had a contact, and I will be lining something up to speak to both about getting quotations.

Lastly, Ryan T. will have an updated quarterly distribution amount in early January.

At our second meeting on December 27th, we discussed Bill Bush's recommendation of setting up a PayPal account for the addition of adding a donation capability to our new website (something he has begun redesigning). I shared an email from Bill I received on the 21st. The PayPal account will require us to give PayPal our bank routing and account numbers. Usually, an organization sets up a new dedicated checking account in the bank they already do business with. This account would only be used foy PayPal transactions, giving PayPal no access to our other accounts.

PalPal versus Venmo -

- 1. PayPal owns Venmo (I had no idea). Either of them would be acceptable to Bill but he feels the question comes down to which one is most broadly used and recognized. Why is that important? Because people want to avoid having to expose their credit card or other donor information to yet another website. By giving through PayPal, there's no additional risk as their payment information doesn't need to go to the church and as Bill pulled from Venmo's website, "charities can add a Pay with Venmo smart button on their website to enable consumers to make payments via Venmo which goes into their PayPal account".
- 2. He feels strongly that Vanco would be a name NOT recognized widely and therefore is likely NOT to be used. Also, Vanco charges a 2% fee each transaction and limits the amount of withdrawals each month (once a month and \$100 minimum) On PayPal you can withdraw any amount any number of times and they have a not-for-profit discount.
- 3. And once again I quote Bill' "Tools, methods, accountability, and simplicity PayPal does online payments for a living". He has used them for online donations for Family Promise, his church in Texas and the Lions Club in Texas. PayPal provides the website code, a QR code and a hyperlink that can be shared with people to donate. The online statements and accounting are easy to use and straightforward.

Mission and Social Concerns Ministry Team Minutes January 3, 2024

Jan is moving to Fellowship Team. She will continue to replenish the food cupboard. Even so, she will be missed. Thank you, Jan, for your contributions to the mission of WPC.

Food Pantry update – Don and family took the Reverse Advent Calendar Donations to the pantry. By Jan 14th they have been taken by the clients who use the food pantry.

Food Cupboard "Take what you need, Give what you can." - It is being used whenever the cupboard is filled. From what we have observed, it seems to be used by several different families. One woman told Irene that she had recently lost her job and she used the cupboard to feed her family.

Good Neighbor Fund Update - \$2039 deposited after concert and it is all used.

Weekend Wellness – WPC has been on the packing detail once a month – WPC is down for Jan 16th to pack again.

Packing first and third Tuesday – 250 bags each time. 125 to school each week.

Family Promise – Monday Meals at the Day Center: 8 times this year. Volunteer to help on any of these days by contacting Jody or Irene.

During Lent we will again use the loaf banks and use a blessings calendar. Money given will be sent to the Presbytery for the Hunger Fund. This money is given to food ministries around the Presbytery.

Presbytery Grant – Mission Team will again ask for \$3,000 for the Good Neighbor Fund.

Mission Team Worship – March 17th will be the mission team worship service this year. Pastor Hodong is interested that we provide opportunities for service to the community. It is hoped someone from Family Promise will come and share how we, individually and corporately, could take a more active role in Family Promise. We will discuss other areas that we can provide opportunities for service.

Session met the evening of January 3rd and the mission team's funding for 2024 is 10% of pledges - \$6,680. Session has agreed to look at the mission team line item and see if it can be increased from funds invested with Schwab. The funds invested were excess Operations income in the beginning of the 2000's.




Lent Faith Paint on Saturday, March 9th at 10 am
