1 Corinthians 3:16 "Do you not know that you are God's temple and that God's spirit dwells in you?"

As I said in my sermon, it is boring to hear someone else's travel stories. A lot of times, the speaker talks about his/her experience with excitement, but the listener has not much interest in listening to the story. However, please forgive me when I continue to talk about my trip to Efes (Ephesus), Athens, and Corinth, because (I insist) it is not any travel story but a tool to give life to our faith. I don't believe it is a "I love tacos" story because reading the Bible books in the locations where they were originally written may provide us with a new insight into reading them. I am even going to make a new sermon series from this experience under the theme, "Faith redefined and transformed" to extend the discussion.


One dominant impression I had from places like Efes and Corinth was the magnificent works of the ancient artifacts like sculptures and buildings and then the cultural/religious/political thoughts and ideologies behind the artifacts. To understand the real-life circumstances that gave rise to Paul's letters is important to discern the meaning and the deeper shape of the text. In the context of their cultural and political backgrounds, Paul presented a radically different identity and purpose of the faith community.

For example, 1 Corinthians 3:16 says, "Do you not know that you are God's temple and that God's spirit dwells in you?" I have never read this verse as I read it now after seeing the temples and statues of Greek gods and goddesses. I believe Paul had in his mind the temples he found everywhere in Corinth, as he used the same word 'temple' for a different meaning. Because Corinth was one of the richest cities in the ancient Greek world through their trades and businesses, people attributed their wealth to the gods and goddesses, keeping the temples in the center of their lives.

For the people of Corinth, their temples were sacred buildings reserved to meet their gods. The belief and ideology behind their temples were dominance and control through which their own safety and prosperity were secured. The relationship between the people and their gods was based on the 'give-and-take' principle, which could easily become a relationship of abuse-and-submission. An Indian Jesuit priest, Anthony de Mello said, "Think for a while of all the coercion and control that you submit to on the part of others when you so anxiously live up to their expectations in order to buy their love and approval or because you fear you will lose them."

However, Paul suggested that the community of the believers was the temple in which God dwelt. His understanding of faith focused on "being the temple" instead of "going to the temple." What is it like to build 'the temple' among the people instead of piling stones in the building? Their temples were sacred but separated from their everyday life. But the temple of the Holy Spirit kept the believers flexible and humble by teaching them alternative ways to accomplish God's will for the people around them. By showing the love of Christ to others and each other, Paul chose the mutual connection rooted in the love of God instead of the magnificence and splendor of their temples. Like Paul, our choice may be too easy or too difficult depending on whether we believe in the perpetuation of the law of God's love.

Weekend Wellness

One mission WPC has supported for many years is Weekend Wellness. It is a mission which gives students food for the weekend in case there is little at home to eat over the weekend.





When the mission began Edie made a lot of purchases at BJ's. She and Eric delivered the food and carried it to the basement. Edie put together work parties to fill the bags.

Then bags, ready to deliver, were purchased from Food Link. So, the boxes were carried down and carried up to be delivered to the schools. During the pandemic the bags were free. After the pandemic, we were able to purchase from Food Link at a reduced price, but in 2023 Food Link stopped the reduced price and the Food Pantry came to the rescue.





In 2023-2024 school year, the Food Pantry purchased food and packed bags and about 95 bags were taken to the schools each week. But this was expensive! The food pantry found the cost per bag to be about \$8 which is about \$30,000 per year. Last year Weekend Wellness Funds of \$12,000 and

\$3,000 from Mission Funds were given to the Food Pantry.

This year we don't have \$15,000, only \$2,000. I know the mission team asks constantly for food and/or money, but... Maybe you belong to a group that gives money to worthwhile groups. Maybe you have some extra money. Maybe you'd like to buy mac and cheese cups, Beef-a-Roni, granola bars, fruit cups, or individual cereals and give them to Weekend Wellness.

- We plan to bake and sell cookies for Canal Town Days.
- We'll pack bags during the school year.
- We need to find funding for the year.

Mission and Social Concerns, another mission that costs money. Update on Emergency Food Cupboard.

The Cupboard is typically filled 3 to 4 times a week. In a month, the Cupboard is filled typically 12-16 times. Each time we try to provide at least the following, depending upon availability:

- 3 Boxes of Cereal
- 3 Packets of dried milk or containers of liquid, non-refrigerated milk
- 2 cans tuna fish
- 2 cans chicken
- 2 packages of various pasta (spaghetti, shells, elbows, etc.)
- 2 large jars/cans pasta sauce (meat or meatless)
- 2 packages of macaroni & cheese
- 1 jar peanut butter
- 1 jar jelly or jam
- 1 loaf of bread
- 2 packages of instant mashed potatoes
- 2 Packages of Knorr casserole mixes
- 3 cans of vegetables corn, peas, beans, carrots
- 2 cans of soup (tomato, chicken noodle, vegetable, etc.)
- 2 cans Beef Stew
- 2 Cans Ravioli
- 2 Cans Chili
- 2 cans Beef-a-Roni or Spaghetti & Meat Balls

- 2 cans of fruit (pears, apples, peaches, fruit cocktail, etc.)
- 4-6 individual serving fruit cups
- 1 package of breakfast, granola, cereal, energy, etc. bars
- 2 packages of dried lentils or beans
- 3 Rolls of Toilet Paper
- 3 packages of 4 diapers each for size 3 and size 4
- 3 packages of 4 each for size 3-4 and 4-5 pullups

This year, no funds are being provided from the Endowments. The Cupboard is being filled by individual donations, the Women's Association, drop off donations by the community and the Lions Collection Food Drive. The Palmyra Food Pantry sometimes has surplus items that are gladly taken.

The Food Cupboard is delivering between \$800 to \$900 per month to meet the emergency food needs of the people in Palmyra. Typically, the Cupboard is empty when it is refilled. If there were the funds and donations, the Cupboard could be filled each day!

So why not add a couple of items to your shopping cart each time you go to the store, or order items on-line? You can put your donation directly into the cupboard, or bring it on a Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday when Kathy is in the office, or bring donations on Sunday and leave items on the shelves at the front parking lot door. A few items from many people will help meet the needs of this effort.
