What does the resurrection of Jesus mean to you?

How much do you know about Christianity? Why and how did it begin? What is the most important factor that makes Christianity unique and different from other religions, even from Judaism? A lot of people including many scholars simply explain that Christianity began as a movement within Second Temple Judaism during which various sects within Judaism such as the Pharisees, Sadducees, and Essenes emerged, and Christians (followers of the Christ) were also formed in that period as a sect and they gradually diverged from Judaism for the first few centuries.

However, such an analysis does not do justice, especially to the Christians in the early Church Era, because, unlike Judaism and its various sects, Christians never dreamed of the restoration of the glory of King David for Israel as their primary vision. Of course, the followers of Jesus in the Gospels expected him to be a new Davidic ruler at first, as seen in Matthew 21:9, "Hosanna to the Son of David!" But after the ascension of Jesus and the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, the early church spread to Gentile territories primarily through missionary activities by the Apostles such as Peter, Philip, and Paul, which took a different direction from Judaism's core tenets. The Book of Acts is full of such stories for Christianity to extend beyond the ethnic and cultural boundaries.

For the early Christians as well as modern Christians, the only thing that made Christianity uniquely different has been the person and the work of Jesus Christ, who they believed is the Son of God and the Messiah. More specifically, what made Christianity exist was the resurrection of Jesus. Everything else in Christianity has been developed in the forms of doctrine, liturgy and mission to reflect his resurrection and its meaning for the world, which took for centuries, if not millenniums.

How could it happen? How do we make sense of it? What does it mean to us in understanding who God is and what God does in and for the world? How can we interpret his teaching and work in the light of his resurrection? What is the ultimate hope for Christians? How does his resurrection affect our everyday life and the ways we deal with critical issues of our time?

It sounds like an exaggeration, but I believe that anyone who claims to be a Christian must answer one question: "What does the resurrection of Jesus mean to you?" It is not my question, but Apostle Paul said it in 1Corinthians 15: "If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile, and you are still in your sins" (v17). "If only for this life we have hope in Christ, we are to be pitied more than all men" (v19). "If the dead are not raised, (we will say) 'Let us eat and drink, for tomorrow we die" (v32).

For me, the most powerful tenet of Christianity is the belief that the risen Christ brings a new reality of the kingdom of God into the world beyond our comfort and ease. God's reign and presence came through difficult and challenging circumstances. For example, a Franciscan blessing prayer goes like this:

"May God bless you with discomfort at easy answers, half-truths, and superficial relationships, So that you may live deep within your heart.

May God bless you with anger at injustice, oppression, and exploitation of people, So that you may work for justice, freedom and peace.

May God bless you with tears, to shed for those who suffer pain, rejection, hunger and war, So that you may reach out your hand to comfort them and to turn their pain to joy."


What the resurrection of Jesus teaches me is that where my discomfort is, that might be his truth. Where truth is, there is freedom. Freedom leads to liberation from bondage of control and domination, because his resurrection has the power to reverse the course of my current life and to break the chain of "sin-shame-fear-self-protection with pretext-to further aggression-destruction." Praise be to the Lord who gives us freedom through conquering the power of death. Amen.



Worry and anxiety are sand in the machinery of life; faith is the oil



How to switch from worry and anxiety to peace was the focus of the Women's Bible study this month. We discussed what brought us peace, such as listening to calming music or a space of quiet and even images of nature. We described the phrase "peace like a river" as a constant motion, seeing the water as a calming element, and that the constancy of the flow is like a sustaining presence of faith never ending, a flow that continues to nurture. Though water can have power, there is also a quiet about it.

We entered into the Biblical study by learning more about Paul and his faith journey. Did you know he had been imprisoned seven times, yes, 7 times! Can you imagine the filth, odors, rodents and disease in the prisons where only a hint of food was offered to sustain the prisoners? To be in this setting and retain the purpose of spreading the word of Jesus was humbling. It was a statement of the powerful faith Paul had. Paul needed to learn to control his anxiety and worries and rely on God. He lifted his cares to the Lord. The Pauline epistles were formal didactic writings intended for public reading and theological instruction. It is said that four of these, the prison epistles, were written by Paul while he was in prison; Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, and Philemon. Through Paul's travels he threated the status quo with his active ministry and faithfulness of God's call. Perhaps the imprisonments put strength to his word as he was unrelenting in his purpose. Did he find peace daily whether in prison or on his travels? We think so.

Philippians 4:6-7 "do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

We focused on peace. How to define it, how to feel it and how it can sustain us at times of trouble. Peace is a place of safety, the knowledge that no harm will come to you, the ability to sleep. Peace is a place not warring or divisive. We seek peace in different ways such as by being out in nature, listening to how the wind moves around us. We find peace in the business of birds in the sky. Music and exercise can offer peace. Peace can come when we help others.

We feel at peace when rocking a baby or watching children joyfully play. We feel peace when someone sits beside us quietly when we need support, no words, just being present. We each feel peace in different ways. Entering into each day, some of us pray that we do no harm to others. The peace is that we rely on and trust in God's ever presence.

There is a hunger for peace when our bodies tend to be crumbling around us. The lack of control we have is such a feeling of helplessness. Peace is the only grace we may have. A grace that is offered to us when we rely on God to sustain us. At that time a quietness overcomes us. A calm. A peace.

Carrie Ten Boom says it simply, "Jesus is our radar through the fog." Amen


