"Wie ein Elefant im Porzellanladen"

It means "an elephant in a porcelain shop" in German. To include the word "elephant," the most commonly used phrase in English might be "an elephant in the room," but as you know, it means something that everyone in the room knows but no one wants to acknowledge it or discuss it. On the contrary, "an elephant in a porcelain shop" is a figurative expression pointing to someone who is careless or reckless and who breaks things in situations that require careful thought or behavior. It is not necessarily because the person is wicked and evil, but simply because the person is given a role or put in a situation that is foreign to him/her for which his/her previous knowledge is useless or even improper. In English, we say, "a bull in a china shop" to give the same meaning, but I prefer the image of an elephant over a bull because it fits better for the character of innocence, shyness, and curiosity to make unintentional mistakes.

As a pastor who constantly struggles with self-doubt of intellect and pastoral skills, one of my coping strategies is to acquire the right knowledge for understanding a situation and making a decision through self-study, introspection and reflection. I understand where I am going wrong and what should be done at the moment, if I am not to be an elephant to break vulnerable and innocent souls in my ministry, unintentionally and even unknowingly. Whether I consider myself a good fit or not may be a relative truth because it is God who calls each of us for a certain work for a certain time. The work to which we are called by God may not be permanent because God's call can be gradual or preparation for a greater call. However, one thing is always true. God uses people who always examine their hearts, as God said to Samuel, "Man looks at the outward appearance, but the Lord looks at the heart."

We are told that taking ownership is an absolute virtue that is to be applied in the workplace and in life. We are encouraged to be proactive, solution-oriented, less emotional but more rational, and accountable, ready to take on any challenges along the way. Taking ownership feels empowering and gives us the authority to make our own decisions. However, making decisions without thinking how they may impact others' lives, and your own life is called impulsive. If taking ownership of our life is an absolute virtue, we could conclude that all addiction problems or family problems in the world are caused by those who don't take ownership in their lives, which is not true.

To take ownership and full responsibility for a job is for a mature person. The person who takes pride in the work they are doing understands that their role matters. It is a virtue to a certain point... until you realize it defines who you are... until you have a possessive mentality that you are the best and only person for the particular job... until your such conviction is broken... until you realize you have no tactic to get out of the cycle of perfectionism.

God doesn't ask us to take ownership in our lives. Instead, the Bible uses a special word called 'stewardship.' It may sound less authentic or less exciting for you, but it draws a clear line between our own ability and God-given gifts, between motivation driven by a temptation of controlling and that which is driven by a purpose of God's calling us. Stewardship requires a process of introspection and reflection, while ownership doesn't, until it takes us to an unhealthy extreme. We are called to steward a role God allows us, trusting that God will take care of the rest. It means ownership is a thing that belongs to God.

As we all are aware, we have the 2024 presidential election coming up. The only requirement for me to choose the right candidate is whether he or she considers him/herself as a steward or an owner. If he or she takes the owner's side, he or she may be an elephant in a porcelain shop causing real troubles in people's lives beginning with the most vulnerable. The Bible says in Proverbs 29:2, "When the righteous are in authority, the people rejoice. But when a wicked man rules, the people groan."

Our memory verse is a shortened version of the one found in our Lesson. **Colossians 3: 1-2** *"If then you have been raised in Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth."*

This scripture is from one of the letters Paul wrote. His focus was to redirect folks



to how the Christian church should be modeled, modeled through Jesus's vision. Paul was seeing that folks were wondering from Jesus' teachings and wanted to reign folks back in. What Do's and Do Not's are there in various faiths? Are these rules dictated in the Bible? For the most part, the answer is 'no' per Paul.

This Epistle written by Paul was a by-product of his passion to ensure the future of the Christian Church. What passions do we have here and now, today in our lives? What might we feel motivated to speak out about? How would we shape the message, who would we want to hear our message? How could we be agents of change through our passions? To do so would mean we would need to put ourselves out there to be judged. Our passion might be to express appreciation for a sermon well done. Might we want to inform others of food availability in our community? Would we want to highlight that all should be honored for their uniqueness's, not their differences? Where is our passion and how do we communicate it?

The differences of earthly belongings and earthly lives compared to Christ-like lives have some glaring differences. Some earthily desires are difficult to let go of such as materialism, mores, electronic devises, greed, grudges, ridged scheduling and the lack of being present. A Christ-like



persona sounds easy to own, but is it really? Is it as easy as following the ten commandments? How do we deliver ourselves from temptations? One person shared that being contrary was a difficult behavior to let go of. As much as we all wanted to be more in-line with compassion, love, humility, patience, forgiveness, acceptance of all; these had challenging hurdles to overcome. Love is the perfect

bond of unity ~ Peace of Christ controls our hearts.

Singing Songs to God

Singing music in church is one of the most beloved parts of worship. It is also one of the main sources of conflict in congregations. Everyone has their own favorite hymns, favorite types of instrumental accompaniment, and personal preference for how loud the music should be. In this passage, Paul isn't concerned with any of those questions. His is concerned with what the music is doing and the inner desire of those who sing it. First, Paul urges the believers to use their singing of psalms, hymns and spiritual songs to build up wisdom through teaching and warning. Second, Paul challenges everyone to sing to God "with gratitude in your hearts." Amen.

Camp Whitman- Cim has a meeting tomorrow. Camp is hoping to expand the camp for adults with developmental disabilities next summer. Saturday is the fall cleanup day.

Presbyterian Youth Triennium- The theme for Triennium 2025 will be As If We Were Dreaming. It will be held July 28-31 in Louisville, Kentucky. It is being held at a convention center and participants will stay in nearby hotels. Several WPC youth are eligible to attend. We need to find out who is

interested and begin thinking of ideas for fundraising.

2025 VBS- Cim will order the new curriculum- True North

Trick or Treat on Main Street- The donation box is out for candy donations. Emily talked to Courtney and she is making WPC labels for the bags. Emily will pack the baggies on October 20 during the Sunday School hour.

Toddler Time- Cim had a record number today- 19 families and 25 children. 15 of the families were new to WPC Toddler Time. She said opening up the crawling room made a big difference. Jan Taylor helped Cim today. The next WPC Toddler Time will be 10/15.

If we get a tv downstairs so volunteers can watch the worship service during nursery time, can church committees take a month and set up volunteers so that the whole responsibility isn't on CE? After all, it should be a whole church effort--**or** hire someone for the nursery for each Sunday and the 2nd person can be a volunteer.

Youth Group- Lisa P and Cim are thinking about apple picking on October 20. Labyrinth- We continued the discussion about using the labyrinth at the Episcopal Church. This could be used for a youth group event or an educational theme. Pastor Hodong will talk to Keisha to set up a day before winter comes. We will keep an eye out for more information and look for an alternative plan if it is not happening this year. Mission Budget – Finance met and proposed that Mission receive funds for 2024 as per our budget request. \$20,285. The session's approval was given at the meeting on Tuesday evening. Checks will be sent to the various missions except the \$2000 for the Food Cupboard and \$2,000 Food Pantry. Irene has bought cereal by the case from Wegman's for the food cupboard. Ruth will continue to buy personal health and cleaning supplies that cannot be purchased with SNAP benefits.

Most Mission Budget amounts are given below but for those not listed:

- 1. **Meals on Wheels -** \$2,000
- 2. Clint McCoy Feeding Center in Malawi \$500
- 3. Victim Resource Center \$1,000
- 4. **Presbytery Mission -** \$2540
- 5. **Synod Mission** \$100
- 6. **PCUSA Mission -** \$100

Food Pantry update – Things are going well. The pantry is being used by many families to make their budget stretch. The next pantry meeting is October 22 at Dave Nagel's. 70 dinners will be boxed for both Thanksgiving and Christmas. Birthday Bags are needed all the time. Women's Circle do collect a few bags at each meeting.

Food Cupboard "Take what you need, Give what you can." The Lions Club held a Fall Collection drive. The event was well received, and a lot of food was collected.

The food cupboard has been filled more regularly by volunteers. The cupboard is being used and, on the days, it is filled twice a day, it is being used twice as much. If you see the cupboard needs replenishment, please do it.

Good Neighbor Fund Update – Balance of \$49.34 remains. We will send \$3,000 from our budget. \$1,000 has already been sent.

Weekend Wellness update – There is a remaining balance in the Weekend Wellness account of \$1,000 with Wilma. Money was received from Pal-Mac Rotary. \$7,000 was sent to the Food

Pantry. Our budget will send another \$3,000 to the Food Pantry to use for Weekend Wellness purchases.

Bags are being filled the first and third Tuesdays. Those are the days that the Lions Club meets. Irene let Noreen know that if she needed bags filled WPC would be able to do it on a different day.

This fall 64 bags have been taken to the school each week, 128 so far this school year.

Family Promise – There are 2 new families in the program; a mother and her 4 youth are staying in the Day Center, and a mother and her 2 children are in an apartment in Lyons.

The WPC Fall Family Promise dinners are Nov. 4th and Nov 25th. \$2,000 will be sent to Family Promise.

Healthy Ninos Honduras – The latest newsletter states the needs of the people since the pandemic have increased over 3-fold. They used to serve 8 children and their mothers, bringing them into housing and care for them until they are healthy. 167 children and their mothers have been served in the first 6 months of 2024. The mission says they can feed the children for \$40 per month. The mission team planned to send \$800 for 20 water purification buckets. It was decided we will send the check to the mission and let them use the \$800 as they choose for food or water bucket.

Hurricane Helene victims are being fed by Black Mountain Presbyterian Church. The church's website has a button to click to give donations to help with this mission.

One Great Hour of Sharing – Cassie will make the announcement on Oct 20th, the day of the collection. Randy made a moving invitation to give to the OGHS – helping hurricane victims and other Presbytery Disaster Assistance. Rena is the liturgist on Oct. 13th, and she will make an announcement about the offering.

Beginning December 1st, we will have a **Reverse Advent Calendar**. Irene will be sure to update the calendar dates. It will be in December's Spire.

Budget for 2025 – for our mission \$21,350 and for the wider church \$2,745.

Next meeting will be November 7 at 9:30 AM.

PROPERTY MINISTRY TEAM - MINUTES

- 1. The meeting was opened with a prayer from Phil.
- 2. Thanks for the new comfy chairs.
- 3. James reported that the handicap chair isn't working. So, James will contact the manufacturer for a correction.
- 4. Chair carts-2 full and 2 now empty. Many went to the fair.
- 5. The new cleaning service seems to be working well. They even cleaned the fellowship hall fan blades.
- 6. Querry-should we develop a simple contractor form for any and all services to the property committee. Just so we have a written example of all maintenance for the building.
- 7. The T loop discussion- We got a new set up ten years ago; however, the newest hearing aides are no longer programmed as T loop compatible. And since Facebook has a 10-15 second delay in the audio, it may cost over \$2,000 for a compatible new system. The committee is looking into other sources such as Bluetooth with our own Wi-Fi.
- 8. We will inquire with the fair if they would like our old wooden tables that are in the basement.
- 9. We are looking at purchasing new handles for the kitchen cupboards in the old kitchen as a safety measure with the little ones who visit on Mommy and Tot days.
- 10. A large baby gate has been purchased for downstairs to split the old kitchen to increase use of the room.
- 11. Gary rented the lift from Blazey's and cleaned the gutters. He filled 3 buckets with stuff.
- 12. In time 5-10 years when the roof will need to be redone, we should put in new heavier grade gutters at the same time.
- 13. The regional safety inspector came to church in September to check for any violations that need to be corrected to comply with the local zoning laws. So, we need to change a few things.
 - A. Test buttons on the safety lights don't work. Need to replace all locations.
 - B. Need new florescent exit signs.
 - C. Time to recharge and add a couple of new ones: ie The Mary Griffith room.
 - D. More carbon monoxide monitors are needed.
 - E. The inspector will return and give us more info. in depth in October.

- 14. There are two exit doors that are problematic. One is the Mary Griffith outside door and the north side basement door. By law both need crash bars.
- 15. The boiler inspection is December 2.
- 16. The fire department now has an outside and inside key so that they will not have to break windows to get in.
- 17. Parking cement blocks 16 six footers are going to be purchased for \$200. Gary will install them.
